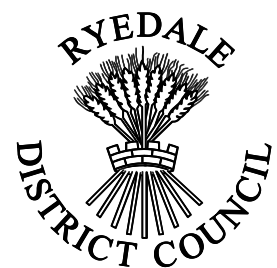

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Introduction

Ryedale is a predominantly rural area covering some 575 square miles (148,900 hectares) in North Yorkshire. Geographically the largest district in North Yorkshire, Ryedale comprises a rich agricultural area, as well as including part of the North York Moors National Park. The district population 50,872 (2001 Census) is centred mainly in the twin towns of Malton and Norton, where the administration centre has been established, and the market towns of Pickering, Kirkbymoorside and Helmsley.

Ryedale is divided into twenty wards, made up from 115 parishes, and a profile is available for each ward.

House Price Index March 2004

House price inflation in the North East (26.2 per cent), the North West (19.1 per cent) and Yorkshire and the Humber (17.9 per cent), remains substantially higher than in the rest of England. The East had the lowest rate of inflation in March, at 0.5 per cent.

Regional inflation determined by the ODPM is more influenced by the market for the higher priced properties (i.e. the demand for detached houses).

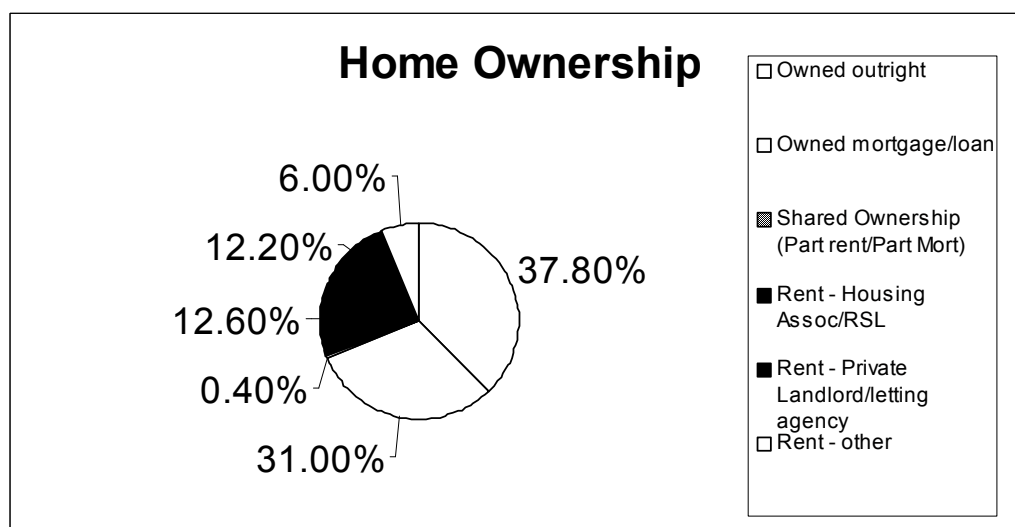

The 2004 index is based on 32,482 Super Output Areas with a geographical base covering between 1000 to 3000 people. This provides a more in-depth appreciation of variations in deprivation at a more local level than the 2000 index which was based on 8,414 Wards. Also, the new Super Output Areas are more consistent in size in comparison to the Wards.

The Indices of Deprivation 2004 data is made up of seven domains of deprivation. These are:

- Income deprivation
- Employment deprivation
- Health deprivation and disability
- Education, skills and training deprivation
- Barriers to Housing and Services
- Crime (new for 2004 Indices)

Attendance

The average attendance of secondary students has risen slightly and is above those of our statistical neighbours and the national averages.

Authorised absence is below the average for our statistical neighbours and below national figures. In 2000 authorised absence in North Yorkshire secondary schools amounted to 6.5%. This figure has remained constant over the last three years.

Unauthorised absence is in line with the average for our statistical neighbours and below the national average. In 2000 unauthorised absence in North Yorkshire secondary schools amounted to 0.5%. During the last five years this figure has increased by 0.2%.

Exclusions

The proportion of students permanently excluded from our secondary schools has remained constant but the proportion of girls excluded has risen slightly. These figures are below those of our statistical neighbours and those of schools nationally. The LEA has successfully improved upon the target set for excluded pupils. In 2000-1 the target was for no more than 70 pupils excluded. North Yorkshire excluded only 40 pupils during this period.

Travel to School

Since 1991/1993, the proportion of primary-aged children walking to school has declined from 60 to 51%, with an increase from 29 to 41% in the numbers being driven to school. For secondary school pupils there was a similar shift from walking to car use.

In the morning peak period (8-9am), cars taking children to school have been an increasing proportion of car trips. The peak time in 2002 was at 8.50 am, when 19% of car trips by residents of urban areas in term time were generated by the school run compared with 14 % in 1991/1993.

Over the whole 'peak' hour from 8 to 9 am, 12% of car trips were for 'escort education' (taking children to school).

Wharram Percy deserted medieval village is a Scheduled Ancient Monument in Wolds Ward.

Derwent Ward has the highest number of Scheduled Ancient Monuments in Ryedale – nearly 80. Its Scheduled Ancient Monuments include at Kirkham the bridge, Kirkham Priory - Augustinian Monastery, the monastic precinct, three fishponds and precinct boundary and a long barrow incorporating part of a medieval field system.

In 2003, 61 local authorities took part in extensive piloting of all-postal ballots and remote electronic voting. For the first time, all pilots bar one were held in all the contested wards in each pilot authority, which meant that over 6.4million electors were in pilot election areas. The average turnout in areas where all-postal elections were held was nearly 50% and where e-voting was used alongside traditional methods, more than a fifth of voters opted to cast their vote electronically.
